2025 Call for Projects Alaska Federal Lands Access Program

The Western Federal Lands Highway Division (WFLHD) of the Federal Highway Administration is soliciting for capital improvement, enhancement, transit, planning, and research proposals to receive funds through the Alaska Federal Lands Access Program in fiscal years 2029 - 2031. Proposal awards will be contingent upon availability of funds. Proposals must be received by October 31st, 2025.

What is the purpose of the Federal Lands Access Program?

The purpose of the Federal Lands Access Program (FLAP) is to improve transportation facilities that provide access to, are adjacent to, or are located within Federal Lands. The FLAP helps supplements State and local resources for public roads, transit systems, and other transportation facilities, with an emphasis on high-use recreation sites and economic generators.

Where can proposals be located?

Proposals must be located on Federal Lands Access Transportation Facilities. Federal Lands Access Transportation Facilities means a public highway, road, bridge, trail, or transit system that is located on, is adjacent to, or provides access to Federal lands for which title or maintenance responsibility is vested in a state, borough, town, township, tribal, municipal, or local government. Maintenance means the preservation of the entire roadway surface, shoulders, roadside ditches, drainage structures, bridges, and traffic control devices necessary for safe and efficient operations. Vested maintenance responsibility means that the majority of the cost for these activities is borne by the state, borough, town, township, tribal, municipal, or local government.

Applicants are to include supporting documentation which clearly shows which agency has title and/or maintenance responsibly of the facilities.

Who may apply?

All proposals must be submitted jointly by the agency with title or vested maintenance responsibility (State, borough, town, township, tribal, municipal or local government) for the Federal Lands Access Transportation Facility and the Federal Land Management Agency(ies) (FLMA) whose lands are accessed. Early coordination between the appropriate FLMA and state/borough/local/tribal government is encouraged to ensure adequate time for thorough review and input before the submittal due date.

Proposals must be signed by the appropriate following agency officials:

Proposals that do not have the signatures that are listed above will not be eligible for consideration. If the FLMA was not listed above and/or you have any questions regarding the appropriateness of the signing official, please contact Samantha Shields (see contact info below). Electronic signatures are acceptable.

What types of proposals will be considered?

Proposals will be accepted for the following:

<u>Capital Improvements</u>- These proposals include rehabilitation, restoration, construction, and reconstruction of roads and bridges. This includes improvements such as safety improvements, widening, realignments, surfacing, culverts, signing, guardrail, walls and associated roadway appurtenances.

<u>Enhancements</u>- These proposals are road and trail related improvements such as interpretative signing, kiosks, viewpoints, adjacent vehicular parking areas, roadside rest areas (including sanitary and water facilities), provisions for pedestrians and bicycles, acquisition of scenic easement and scenic or historic sites, trailheads, trails, and improvements that improve public safety and reduce vehicle-wildlife mortality while maintaining habitat connectivity.

<u>Transit</u>- These proposals include construction of transit facilities and limited duration operation/maintenance of transit services and facilities (including vehicles).

<u>Planning</u>- These proposals include engineering studies, corridor management planning, bicycle/pedestrian planning and alternative transportation planning and road safety audits. These studies or plans should primarily address access to federal public lands that will provide valuable information for future eligible FLAP nomination proposals.

<u>Research</u>- These proposals include evaluating solutions that enhance access, safety or sustainability. They address issues such as wildlife-vehicle collision avoidance measures, context sensitive roadside safety features, and congestion management strategies. Research must be broad-based and applicable to multiple Federal Lands Management Agencies.

Proposals should also be consistent with a statewide, regional, borough, local, or tribal transportation plan and a Federal Land Management Plan. Proposals that are specifically identified in a transportation plan will receive additional consideration.

What size proposal will be considered?

The Alaska Federal Lands Access Program is currently estimated to receive about \$7.5 million annually. Leveraging additional funding is encouraged to further the FLAP funding. Historically, there were limits on the amount of funding per project. However, this call does not limit the requested amount and every project will be reviewed based on merit and feasibility.

The best available data should be used in developing the initial cost estimate. Typically, if project construction costs exceed the originally approved program amount, the proposal proponents will be responsible to provide the additional funds. It is best to work with the delivery agency to develop the best cost estimate.

Are matching funds required?

The program does not require matching funds; however, it is encouraged to further the Federal Lands Access Program funding. Applicants may elect to provide additional funds to contribute to the project. Additional contributions secured or being sought to implement towards the project should be described in the proposal.

Are Tribes eligible to apply for Federal Lands Access Program funding?

Tribes may apply for Federal Lands Access Program funding if the road or facility being proposed for funding is owned or operated by the Tribe and provides access to a Federally-owned land (not a Tribal land or private land). For example, a Tribally-owned road (as opposed to a BIA-owned road) that provides access to a national park or national forest is eligible for the Federal Lands Access Program.

How do I submit a proposal?

The best available data should be used in completing the project proposal forms. Maps and photos must be included to support the proposal. Maps must include project locations, project limits or termini, high use federal recreation sites, federal economic generators, and most importantly, **show the Federal Lands accessed by the proposal**. Letters of support from other entities may also be included. The Excel document must be used to generate your costs and a copy of the Excel file must be submitted along with your PDF application document.

Email the completed proposal form with all required signatures, estimate maps, photos and any letters of support and the Excel file of the estimate to:

The proposal must be received by **October 31, 2025**. The entire proposal packet (the proposal form, estimate, signature pages, maps, photos, and any letters of support) should not exceed 10 megabytes in file size and must not exceed 30 pages.

How will the proposals be evaluated?

A Technical Advisory Group (TAG) will review the proposals according to the following evaluation criteria (see attached for additional details): Recreation/Economic, Safety, Asset Investment, Mobility, and Readiness/Support. Preference shall be given to proposals that provide access to high-use federal recreation sites or federal economic generators, as identified by the Federal Land Management Agency.

The TAG will be facilitated by the WFLHD and include representatives from the Alaska Department of Transportation and Public Facilities, Alaska Municipal League, Bureau of Land Management, National Park Service, U.S Army Corps of Engineers, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and U.S. Forest Service. The TAG may request additional information during the evaluation process. Proponents should be ready to provide documentation that substantiates, clarifies or appends any information provided in the proposals.

How will a final decision be made on the proposals?

The Program Decision Committee (PDC) made up of representatives from WFLHD, Alaska Department of Transportation and Public Facilities and Alaska Municipal League will make a final decision on the proposals. The PDC will make these decisions based on the evaluation criteria and recommendations of the TAG, and coordination with the Federal Land Management Agencies prior to making a final decision.

The TAG should complete initial proposal evaluations by the end of December 2025. Final recommendations of the TAG and PDC final decisions on the proposals are currently scheduled for the end of January 2026 with notifications in 2026.

Who will be the lead agency for project delivery?

The preferred lead agency for project delivery will usually be the WFLHD. Project delivery consists of Federal environmental compliance, design, construction contract advertisement, and construction contract administration. However, the lead agency and participating agencies roles will be considered during proposal evaluation. The project proponents may suggest another Federal agency or the Alaska DOT&PF take the lead for project delivery. On a case-by-case basis, it may be determined that the local agency is the best fit to deliver the project. Decisions regarding lead and participating agency roles will be based on project type, project complexity, proposed delivery, previous experience in delivering Federal Highway (Title 23) funded projects, and ability to satisfy Federal Highway Administration project delivery requirements. WFLHD or the FHWA Division Office will be responsible for stewardship and oversight of the project to assure compliance with Federal requirements.

WFLHD as the lead agency – The project will be scoped to determine the scope schedule and budget based on the following: fixed budget, fixed scope, ideal scope and budget. The scoping (approximately \$150,000) will be followed by PDC approval and delivery of the project.

Another federal agency as the lead agency – The project will be delivered by another federal agency with WFLHD performing stewardship and oversight of the project at a cost of approximately \$50,000. The project will be subject to an indirect cost rate of approximately 15%.

Alaska DOT&PF as the lead agency – The project will be delivered by the Alaska DOT&PF with the FHWA Division Office performing stewardship and oversight of the project. The project will be subject to Indirect Cost Allocation Plan (ICAP) costs (approximately between 4.5% - 7.5%).

Local Agency as the lead agency – On a case-by-case bases, a local agency can deliver the project. Additional information will be collected through the ranking process such as: A communication plan, a management plan and a capacity/capability assessment. WFLHD performing stewardship and oversight of the project at a cost of approximately \$50,000 and additional costs may be incurred due to the NEPA process.

What if I have questions?

In conjunction with this Call for Projects, WFLHD will conduct an informational webinar on July 29th, 2025. This webinar will provide information to potential applicants on the FLAP, eligibility, evaluation criteria, how to submit proposals, and helpful hints for filling out proposal forms.
